Please be aware provisions of California Government Code Section 54954.2(b) prohibit the Recreation Commission from taking any immediate action on an item which does not appear on the agenda, unless it meets stringent requirements. The Chair may limit the length of your presentation.

**6.1 AC TRANSIT PROPOSED BUS SERVICES CHANGES**

**BACKGROUND:** AC Transit is proposing two scenarios for a frequent transit network (i.e. service every 15 minutes or better) to serve parts of Fremont and Newark. In doing so, AC Transit is proposing the alteration and/or discontinuation of bus service that significantly impacts the Fremont community in three primary areas:

**1. Elimination of bus service (Lines 215 and 239) serving Central Park along Paseo Padre Parkway**

Elimination of service along Paseo Padre Parkway will impact many seniors, youth and families who use the bus stops along this route to access all parts of Central Park including the Senior Center, Teen Center, Community Center, Skate Park, Tennis Center and Aqua Adventure. AC Transit’s proposal to re-route service to run along Stevenson Blvd. (with the new bus stop located ½ mile from the current stop in front of the Senior Center) will severely impact community members’ ability to access Central Park activities, such a teen programs, summer camps, concerts and movies in the park, picnics and many other special events.

In addition, many individuals, especially those with limited walking abilities and seniors, will find it much more difficult to walk the ½ mile from the proposed new stop. For the senior services and programs, the difference in distance will impact their ability to easily access affordable, hot lunches, health care services, social services and wellness programs offered at the Senior Center. Additionally, removal of bus service serving Central Park will significantly impact the City of Fremont’s Travel Training Program. Since 2008, this program has provided hands-on training for over 2,100 seniors and people with disabilities on AC Transit and other regional transit systems, a majority of whom have participated in the monthly travel training workshops at the Senior Center.

**2. Elimination of bus service along Mission Blvd between Decoto and Niles Boulevard (service to the Sikh Gurdwara and neighborhoods along Mission Blvd)**

The Sikh Temple is an important community destination, and the City, County, and Caltrans have partnered over several years to bring bus service to the area and install improvements (new bus shelters and a traffic signal) to facilitate bus travel to the temple and surrounding neighborhood.

### **3. Significant reduction of bus service in the Irvington District**

The proposed service options do not adequately serve the Irvington District. Service Option 1 provides no direct bus connection to a BART station. Neither service option serves the Osgood corridor which currently has more than 760 units of infill housing proposed, approved, or under construction. The Osgood corridor is also identified as a priority corridor for transit priority improvements in the Alameda County Transportation Commission's East 14th/Mission Boulevard and Fremont Boulevard planning effort. The development in the Osgood corridor is transit oriented development, being planned and constructed in advance of the 2026 opening of the Irvington BART Station, and includes affordable housing units. It is critical to provide transit options to these new developments in advance of BART service coming online.

The AC Transit Board of Directors is holding a public hearing on the two proposals for redesigned service in Fremont and Newark on March 26, 2020 at 2:00 pm and 6:00 pm at the Fremont Main Library located at 2400 Stevenson Blvd. in the Fukaya Room to hear community feedback on the two bus service proposals. City staff encourages AC Transit to refine bus route options to retain transit service to these important community destinations/neighborhoods.
