Event Highlights

- Fremont participation:
 - 31 FUSD schools signed up
 - 29 FUSD schools sent in data
 - 9,765 students participated
 - Almost 300% more than last year!
- Students who walked, rolled, carpooled, or bused:
 - 4701 students walked to school
 - 1199 students rolled to school
 - 1043 students carpooled to school
 - 122 students bused to school

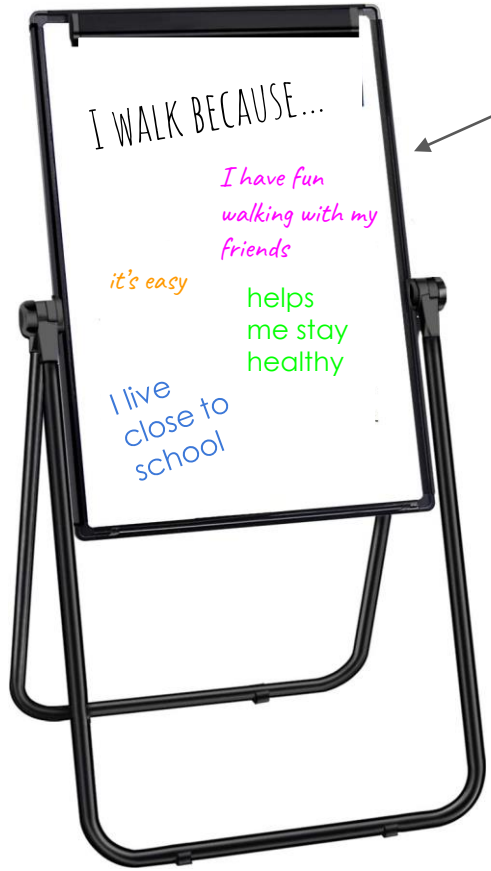

Slow Down, Look Out for People Walking: September is Pedestrian Safety Month

Fremont, Calif. – September is Pedestrian Safety Month, and Fremont Police Department will participate in activities throughout the month encouraging the safety of people walking.


Based on data projections from the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA) <https://tinyurl.com/2p8xcpjk> 7,485 people, or an average of 20 people every day, died after being struck by a vehicle last year – an 11.5% i... See more

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY TIPS

- Keep your eyes up, and your phone down.
- Wear bright-colored clothing or reflective gear if walking at night.
- Look left, right and left again before crossing the street.
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing the street.
- Always walk on sidewalks. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible.
- Do not run or dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

BikeMobile (All)

- Team of mechanics fixes students' bikes.
- Teaches students how to perform at-home maintenance.



Bike Rodeos (ES)

Fun-filled, hands-on training courses that teach elementary school students how to ride on the road using a simulated city streets course.

Students learn how to:

- Properly start and stop their bike
- Hand signal
- Fit a helmet
- Ride in a straight line
- Ride safely and predictably



Pedestrian Rodeos (ES)

Interactive presentations where students learn how to make their way through real-life traffic.

Students practice how to:

- Read traffic signs and signals
- Cross the street safely
- Recognize and avoid hazards
- Know the laws governing pedestrians

Travel Training (Access MS/HS)

- Educates students on how to use active and shared transportation, such as:
 - The pros and cons of walking, biking, rolling and taking transit
 - How to obtain and use a student transit pass or youth Clipper Card
 - Traveling independently without a car
- Various presentation lengths to fit class schedule
- Prioritizing: Access Middle and High Schools (Centerville, Mission San Jose High, Robertson High)



Fremont's Safe Routes to School Program

Conducted by Safe Moves

- Interactive and age/grade appropriate learning
- Hands-on approach to identify hazards and high-risk behavior
- Identify safe choices as pedestrians and bicyclists



In-School Activities

- City Rodeo
- Assemblies
- PE Classes
- Community Rodeo



Current Challenges

- Limited time during school day
- Misunderstanding dangers to children
- Limited space on the blacktop
- School administration approval



Potential Solutions

- After school rodeos
- Saturday family events
- Class-by-class virtual programs
- Provide safety/collision data
- Explain the limitations of children
