Economic Update

- National Economy Continues to Expand
 - GDP grew by 3.4% in the fourth quarter of 2023
 - Unemployment rate rose slightly to 3.9% in April 2024
- High Interest Rates Discourage Borrowing
 - Fremont real estate transactions declined 23% in 2023
 - GDP slowed to 1.6% in first quarter of 2024
- City's Proposed Budget Assumes Moderate Growth
 - Property tax growth projected at lower than historical levels for FY 2024/25

Reserves Ensure Service Continuity


- Contingency Reserve fully funded in Proposed Budget
- Forecast assumes \$5.6 million of the Budget Uncertainty Reserve will be used in FY 2023/24

General Fund Reserves	Proposed Funding FY 2024/25
Contingency Reserve (16.7%* of expenditures and transfers out - address unforeseen events)	\$46.1 Million
Budget Uncertainty Reserve (Financial risk in 3-year forecast - offset revenue/expenditure uncertainty)	24.4 Million
Total Reserves	\$70.5 Million

*GFOA recommended level is no less than two months of regular operating expenditures (16.7%).

Summary

- National economy expanding at a moderate pace
 - High interest rates discouraging home buyers and businesses
- FY 2024/25 Proposed Budget addresses near-term revenue shortfall
 - Budget Uncertainty Reserve helps preserve service levels as State recovers its sales tax overpayment to the City
 - Service enhancements address City Council priorities while maintaining fiscal sustainability
- Forecast shows revenue covering expenditures in future years
 - No use of reserves needed in FY 2025/26 and FY 2026/27
